

RESIDENTIAL ACCOMMODATIONS CHECKLIST

For Students Transitioning to College

	1. ON CAMPUS TOURS & BEFORE GRADUATION
	Go on campus tours and ask to see a typical dorm room.
	While on a campus tour, ask to see a typical classroom, dining hall & the Accessibility Office.
	Ask for a copy of the most recent IEP/504 plan & any medical evaluations.
	2. AFTER ENROLLING IN COLLEGE
	Visit the college website and search for "disability," or "accessibility," to find the correct office.
	Fill out the Registration Form on the Accessibility Office website.
	Provide recent medical or psychological documentation (typically within the last $2\!-\!3$ years) explaining the need for the accommodation.
	Schedule a short conversation with an Accessibility Office staff member Your student should be prepared to explain how their disability affects daily living and why certain housing accommodations are helpful.
	Receive your Accommodation Letter (sent via email or in online portal).
	3. DURING SEMESTER
	Give Accommodation Letter to campus offices impacted.
	Be a self-advocate to ensure accommodations are provided.
	If issues arise, the student should contact the Accessibility Office.
